## **Board Chair Musings**

The Board of Trustees is now meeting late in the month (4th Tuesday). I therefore end up having to rush to write up my thoughts for the month as soon as the meeting is over. Good in that everything is fresh, difficult because it isn't always easy to put ideas in perspective.

The board is involved in a great deal of important work. Most of that will be reviewed during the Congregational Townhall meeting at the end of March (see article below). We have the beginnings of work towards long-range planning, we are hopeful that the parking lot is going to be replaced this summer/fall, we are encouraging a hard review of how to make our deck sustainable, as well as many other smaller projects. We will make progress on all of our activities, although some may take longer than we would like. And we will need to ask for help from many others to have significant impact.

One important piece of new has to do with our financials. As many of you are aware, the Board of Trustee hired an Independent Auditor last year to review the church's financial books for fiscal year ending June 30, 2018. The audit is substantially complete and the draft report was submitted to the PBUUC Finance Committee and Board of Trustees just this week for our review. There are additional steps to take, such as a meeting between the auditor, staff, treasurer and finance committee, as well as the creation of the final report. I have reviewed the report and while I cannot understand all of the details without some help, I can decipher that the PBUUC books and our operating funds do reconcile for the year. This means the money in our bank is correctly represented in the computer accounting as Income and Expenses. More will be passed during our Town Hall meeting.

If you have questions or concerns for the Board, I hope you will reach out to one of us. Our main duty is to accurately represent the congregation as we deliberate issues.

The Power of We: 2019 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association in Spokane, Washington, June 19 – 23, 2019

The General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of Unitarian Universalists from all over the world. This is an opportunity to meet, worship, learn, and act with a variety of UUs with whom we are bonded by our covenant of living by our seven principles.

### Here are some time-sensitive highlights:

**March 1** is a key date for submitting a volunteer application. If you are selected for one of a variety of assignments, your registration fee will be waived.

**March 1** is also the first date available for making hotel reservations through the UUA Housing Reservations system. It is important that you use the UUA system so that they receive the discounts on meeting rooms and other services that minimize conference costs.

**April 30** is the last date to register at the early bird rate. You can also register as late as onsite. Early bird registration is \$425 for the full conference. This does not include travel, hotels, and food. You can do GA on a budget by volunteering and thus waiving the registration fee, sharing rooms, or asking for home hospitality.

You can attend and take advantage of the hundreds of workshops, hearings, worship services large and small—as the spirit moves you. You can also be a delegate or alternate which obligates you to engage in sessions related to the business and the social justice stances coming before the assembly. You can also attend the programrelated activities. You can opt to be an offsite delegate, which gains you admission to the businessrelated sessions. There are GA programs—the Sunday morning Worship Service, for example which will be livestreamed.

You can be an onsite delegate. Registration is \$160. If this interests you, please contact Don Gerson, Chair, and Denominational Affairs Committee, to let him know of your interest. He can also direct you to PBUUCers who have attended GA in the past to give you a more personalized perspective.

BACKGROUND: The Nominating Committee (NomCom) is now seeking candidates for nominations to upcoming open positions on the Board of Trustees. There will be three open seats for full 3year terms. Based on its review and evaluation of the Board's needs going forward, the NomCom will present a slate of one candidate for each vacancy. These candidates, in addition to any nominations from the floor, will be considered for election at our June 9, 2019 Annual Congregational Meeting. All terms will begin July 1, 2019.

DESCRIPTION OF DUTIES: The Board of Trustees holds the legal and fiduciary responsibility for governing PBUUC as a non-profit organization in the State of Maryland.

As a Trustee, you will be responsible for working as a team member to:

- Exercise general direction and supervision of the affairs of the Church.
- Plan and participate in regular and special meetings of the Board and the Congregation.
- ➢ Approve the annual budget and any supplements.
- ➢ Appoint the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Secretary, and Assistant Secretary.

Hire church staff (as recommended by the Minister or by a Boardappointed committee).

Trustees must be:

- Able to work together as a team to advance the Church's mission, vision, and goals.
- $\gg$  Active members of the Church.
- Committed to the Church's being a Green Sanctuary, a Welcoming Congregation, and to our resolution of becoming an intentional multicultural congregation.
- ➢ Able to attend a two-hour meeting once a month.
- Be willing to perform Board work outside of meetings, such as participating in or leading special Board-appointed committees or workgroups. e.g., Budget Leadership Team, Capital Campaign.

Although serving on the Board of Trustees involves significant responsibility and a time commitment, many former Trustees report that their terms resulted in adding to their portfolio of skills and knowledge and creating a real sense of "making a difference" in our congregational community.

DARTT OpEd for March Carol Carter Walker

### The Ordinary People Who Paved the Way for the Extraordinary People

During February, Black History Month, there was a great deal of coverage of black heroes and sheroes: Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Harriet Tubman, Marian Anderson, Louis Lattimer, Charles Drew, James Baldwin and the like.

My attendance at a recent family funeral inspired me to reflect on the ordinary black people who paved the way for others to become extraordinary. I am not exactly certain about how we were related. But we were close enough to get together for dinners for family holidays and we all attended the same church and saw a lot of each other there.

My cousin lived to be 94. She was at church the day before she died. At her funeral as her life was recounted, I realized that she was part of the black migration of the 1930s and 1940s. Born in Georgia to a family of sharecroppers, she followed the path of my father and many others who moved from rural Georgia to Washington, DC, in search of a better life. One of her brothers had made this journey earlier. He had already established himself and was a homeowner by 1940. So she came and moved in with him, eventually found a job and a husband at a federal agency and set about to have an extraordinary influence on her family and community. She and her husband bought a house and that house, particularly the basement, became a hub of the community. She offered a safe space for her two daughters and their friends to play and have fun. She used her skills as a cook to open her home for lots of hospitality to family and friends visiting from out of town and a key to the hospitality ministry of her church where she helped prepare breakfast for the neighborhood every Sunday and provided repasts after funerals and other events. She didn't have fancy degrees—she may not have even graduated from high school—and she didn't have a big job. (The federal agency for which she worked had the reputation of being something of a plantation for minority workers.) But it is obvious from the success of her daughters, their love and care in making her comfortable til the last day of her life, that she was, in her way, like so many, many others, an extraordinary influence on her community and her family.

To my 'ordinary' cousin and all others in your mold, "I lift my voice in humble praise to you."

## **Social Action Committee**

### Thank You to All Who Donated!

On behalf of SAC, thank you to all who provided coats, scarves, gloves, hats, blankets, and so much more to immigrants in need. We received a plea from Transit Immigration Assistance (TIA) Silver Spring, and you very generously answered the call.

TIA volunteers meet immigrants newly released from ICE detention facilities who arrive at the Silver Spring Greyhound bus station often with nothing more than the clothes on their backs, many with children. Volunteers meet the buses and respond to the immigrants immediate needs such as snacks, clothing, travel orientation, and phone calls and wait with them until they are safely on their way to their destinations, often sharing a hot meal to fuel them for the next leg of their journey. Volunteers also connect immigrants with people to assist with "next steps" like getting to ICE check-ins, accessing information about an immigrant's case, and accessing local resources (medical, educational, and legal).

The TIA project is organized by Direct Support for Immigrants (DSI), a 501c3 nonprofit subcommittee of Takoma Park Mobilization, SURJ-MoCo, and ACLU of Maryland-Montgomery County Chapter. Collaborating partners currently include DMV Sanctuary Congregation Network and Sanctuary DMV. DSI, founded in November 2016, received the Human Rights First's 2017 World Refugee Day Community Award for Outstanding Work in the Community on Behalf of Asylum Seekers.

Special thanks to Sabrina Jones who stepped in at the last minute to manage pick-up and delivery of our donations to the TIA volunteers.
