Ministry at Paint Branch

Pastoral Care Associates

We are looking for two people to become Pastoral Care Associates. If you are interested, please contact Rev. Rachel Christensen, Lynn Johnson, Jeri Holloway, or Kathy Bartolomeo. A Pastoral Care Associate (PCA) serves at the discretion of the minister and works closely with her to give pastoral care to PBUUC friends and members who have suffered a major loss, serious diagnosis, or serious illness or who have requested it. Pastoral care includes being present with a listening ear and providing comfort. PCAs make telephone calls and visits to hospitals, homes, assisted living, and nursing home/rehabilitation centers to talk with congregants. The PCAs also give a Meditation on Joys and Sorrows almost every Sunday as part of the service. During this time they read aloud the personal joys and sorrows submitted from the congregation. Being a PCA is a rewarding and fulfilling way to serve our PBUUC community.

Interim Co-Chairs Musings:

At the final meeting of this year's Board, we selected leadership to carry the Board through the transition to the new Board. We appreciate the good leadership and hard work of Kate Brett, as Chair, and Marguerite Summers, Vice-Chair. It will be difficult to fill their shoes. As they are moving off the Board, Ebony Contreras and Kathi Yu will serve as interim co-chairs. Noel Monardes agreed to be an interim vice-chair. We will serve as interims until the new Board is ready to select their new leadership.

One of the most important tasks is onboarding the four new members of the Board. Carol Boston, Janet Overton and Melissa Graham were elected to serve three-year terms. Don Gerson was elected to serve the remaining year of Kay McGraw's term. We are planning a retreat so that we can learn about each other, find out why each of us decided to serve on the Board. We may be asking members of the congregation to make presentations to help us understand how the church functions.

There will be a lot of hard work in the coming year. At the June Board meeting, we agreed to contract with Ritter Norton Architects for design work to include replacing the deck, with options for an expanded scope of work, depending on what they learn from you about what you want from the building. This work will be in tandem with the long-term strategy planning.

The long-term strategy will be delegating the portion of the strategy that relates to the facility to the deck committee. However, we will still have decisions to make about what programs are important to us. We need to plan what we need to do to ensure that the members, family and friends of the congregation feel that the church is a welcoming and safe place.

Finally, we want to appreciate the hard work that Carmelita Carter-Sykes dedicated to the Board. She served as Co-Chair for part of her first year on the Board, and as Vice-Chair her second year. She was tireless in her efforts to make the church a better place.

DARTT OpEd for July

This month's Op-Ed Column is the sermon from the closing Worship Service from the 2019 UUA General Assembly in Spokane, Washington. The Sermon is "In This Delicate Turning" by the Rev. As a Latina with skin in the game for thirty years, I observe the changes our faith tradition is undergoing, and note that those not paying attention continue to perpetuate old narratives like: "Nothing has really changed it just looks different." "People are withholding their money because they don't like the direction we've taken." Now remember these "people" are Unitarian Universalists who are living out the seven principles, maybe even an eighth one day. These are not random people who receive a letter in the mail requesting support from the UUA. They are included in whatever version of "we" is being upheld. They are people who love and are loved. They may have taught our youth, taken care of our babies or our sages. Whose inability to deal with open conflict has led to more conflict. Who refuse to understand how their lack of engaging the work causes microaggressions to spill out of them, like unexpected spit in the faces of people who look or talk, or act like me. Who hang on to the supreme whiteness of being, at all costs, and who have not been able to grasp that there is poison in the proverbial water we are all swimming in.

This is a complicated picture, yet despite all of this, you, the faithful gathered when much of what would happen was uncertain. As religious folks, our presence together gives life and potential to new actions. It takes this same faithfulness to jump into the concept of "we" and your presence is an affirmation that you too are in pursuit of this Power of We, because the power of a community is deeper and stronger than the power any individual can have. It's a matter of what defines that power, and I like the kind that has "we" embedded in it.

The power of a real community gives us plenty of hands to take down the pieces of white supremacy we are dismantling and helps to hold the structure in place while the new is being built. In this process I hold out for what we may want to keep. In the same way that not everything is all good, not everything is all bad either. But the only way to uncover what has worth and value and is crucial to maintain is to go on an expedition. We are called to be archeologists of our collective hearts and delicately sift through the blood-soaked rubble.

It is time now, for this great, delicate turning that we find ourselves in. For decades, we Black, Indigenous and People of Color have spoken many times about how exclusionary our faith can be, even as Unitarian Universalism swears, we are the most inclusive. We have all said hard and harsh things to one another in pursuit of that better, truly equal, truly just, life-saving world we know can exist for ourselves and for seven generations to come. And we.are.all.so.tired. All of us know it can be better. All of us know it must be better. But are all of us willing to be better? Trying is no longer good enough. My colleague Sofia Betancourt spoke this truth last year: "... we can never be the bearers of love and justice that the world so desperately needs if the foundation that sustains us is still perpetuating the very problems we long to solve."

Legacy Fund News

The Endowment Committee received three grant proposals from the congregation in 2019. Based on a review of the merits of each proposal, the Endowment Committee recommended and the Board approved allocation of \$3,600 in income from the Legacy Fund to grant recipients as follows: 1) a grant of \$1,800 to the New Day Rising Group for the purpose of hiring qualified consultant (s) to train PBUUC church members on multicultural competency for facilitating difficult conversations around race, ethnicity, and other related matters; and 2) a grant of \$1,800 to the PBUUC Kitchen Committee towards the costs to purchase and install a new Meeting House Kitchen Stove/Oven that meets caterer's standards.
