# **Minister's Notes**

#### Sacred promises, Sacred agreements.

Three of our long time, deeply committed members have resigned in the last two months: Kate Brett, Marguerite Summers, and Van Summers. They each have been important foundational members of the



church, working hard to keep it functioning and stable. They were part of the deep fabric of the church, and they will be missed. I will miss each of them.

I completely respect their decisions, each of them. They each left because they had thought we had sacred promises with each other, sacred agreements as to how we would be with each other. And in their experience, that was not true.

This kind of thing does not just hurt the people who have resigned, although they are deeply hurt. It does not just hurt the work of the church, although that is certainly true. It does not just hurt the board and the leadership, although that is true. It hurts all of us. It damages our relationships, the connective tissue that holds us together, the rich history that we hold collectively, the very fabric of Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church. It profoundly shifts our relationship to the church and our relationships with each other.

My hope is that we will use this as an opportunity to create systemic change in the congregation. To make explicit our sacred promises to each other. To find and establish boundaries that are helpful for all of us, in maintaining healthy relationships and systems. To learn how to address conflict within the church in healthy ways, rather than to be conflict avoidant. To create pathways for bringing concerns or new ideas, so that we can welcome both the creativity and the criticism of our members.

What are the sacred promises within this community? At the worship service on July 28, we talked about making a personal covenant, and provided some questions to help each of us consider how we might do that. How I might do that. How might I make explicit the way that I want to honor my self, my body, my heart and my healing? Do these questions have applicability for other relationships? For all our relationships? See what you think. Take a moment to read and consider the questions. They are reprinted in this issue of the Branches.

Let us begin.

## **Board of Trustees**

#### Words from the Interim Co-Chairs:

We just finished the first meeting of the new Board of Trustees, and we feel energized. This board is ready to tackle the issues necessary to move the congregation forward.

In our first meeting, we spent an hour discussing the creation of a **Covenant of Right Relations** and a **Policy Regarding Destructive Behavior**. New board member Janet Overton brought these UUA policy resources to our attention, tweaked them for our purposes, and did a great job presenting them for our consideration. The Board discussed them at length and made some commonsense proposed changes. Overall, they were well received. We have a small team who will further refine these proposals and determine a way forward to present them to the congregation for feedback. Eventually they will be presented for adoption by the congregation and the Board. The Board agreed that moving forward, we want to focus on restorative measures and not punitive ones when dealing with destructive behavior. Our goal is to keep people in our community. In addition, in response to the motion at the annual meeting, another small team of Board members will work to create a small team of lay members who will work with Rachel to find a mediator to address issues of communications protocols, when they are breached, and the underlying causes. It was the sense of the Board, that these two items are separate for the moment, but they may eventually merge into one.

We do this work to make sure that all feel welcome and safe in our congregation. You will hear more of this as we refine our policies and work on a covenant.

Speaking of making all feel welcome, Kathi received an email from the UUA titled **Aren't We Welcoming Already?** Written by Rev. Michael J. Crumpler of the UUA. He stated, "While approximately 813 UU congregations are officially designated as Welcoming Congregations, only 35 have ever renewed their status. In 2019, the UUA's Multicultural Ministries office launched the new Five Practices of Welcome Renewal for UU congregations. These are five benchmarks that every congregation can integrate into congregational life in order to ensure that lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, asexual, two-spirit, genderqueer, non-binary, and others feel fully welcomed, centered, and embraced in UU congregations."

## Multigenerational ReligiousExploration

#### The What and Why of 'Re-Imagining Sunday'

Re-Imagining Sunday is our once-a-month multigenerational worship service. It's a time for the entire congregation to worship together. You may have noticed that these services are a bit different from our "regular" Sunday services and there are a host of great reasons for that. Let's dig in:

Re-Imagining Sunday is a way for all of us to reimagine what it means to be together, as well as what a worship service might look like. Because children are included, we are more intentional about designing a service that engages a variety of learning and worship styles. We can experiment with movement and participation in the elements of worship. We can engage in conversation or storytelling or creativity across generations. We can be more playful and spontaneous and allow ourselves a spirit of curiosity and experimentation. We can ask "what's possible in this space with these humans?"

Collaborating on these services allows us to reimagine our respective roles in worship and to generously share spaces typically seen as "belonging" to one or the other. We combine our collective skills and knowledge to invite each in attendance to be fed, at least a little bit. Sometimes our re-imagining is wildly successful. Sometimes it falls short. Every time, it provides learning for us and for the congregation. Every time, it allows us to practice being in delighted, curious collaboration with others in the church.

We like to keep the bar of "success" for any Re-Imagining Sunday well within reach and easily observed. We'd like to invite all of you to do the same, especially if Re-Imagining Sunday isn't really your cuppa tea. Personally, we pick one thing to observe. Chris likes to look out for unexpected, positive exchanges across generations. Rachel likes to look out for someone overcoming hesitation to participate. We both like to keep our ears open for laughter or other signs of delight. What might you look for? What's one thing about a Re-Imagining Sunday that might take you by surprise? We'd love to hear from you what you've enjoyed about a recent Re-Imagining Sunday.

How do I create spaces that invite comfort, creativity and studiousness?

How am I a steward of my home?

#### How do I live my Unitarian Universalist faith?

What aspects of my faith are important in times of celebration? What aspects of my faith do I rely on when times get tough? How do I share my faith with others?

How do I live the seven principles?

#### How do I become a person others can count on?

How do I make sure I keep my promises?

How can I use my talents for the benefit of others? How can I increase my skills?

## What sacrifices am I willing to make in the name of the highest good?

What am I willing to give up because it isn't healthy for me, my family, others or my planet?

What am I willing to do for others that doesn't necessarily benefit me?

### Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT)

#### DARTT Advance Successful

The July 21 monthly DARTT meeting was an *Advance* to discuss governance and programming for the church year. There were several successes.

- Attendance. There were eighteen people present—ranging from folks who have attended virtually every meeting since DARTT's 2008 founding, to those who were attending for the first time. There was a diversity of race, ethnicity, gender, sex, age, and length of PBUUC tenure.
- Governance. The group discussed seven proposals about governance structure and made plans for a leadership transition. After a robust discussion, the group decided to adopt the following structure that allows for broad leadership participation, a line of succession, and time-limited terms.

The current co-chairs will develop a list of tasks for the Leadership Team. DARTT will re-visit this structure after six months with an eye toward evaluating and recalibrating if/as necessary.

- Programming. There were a list of programs, initiatives, and tasks developed which will be further refined into a program plan for the year before Fall.
- <u>Communications</u>. After the formal meeting, a small group met to discuss how DARTT and other committees could use software and social media to have more effective inter- and intra- communications.

### DARTT OpEd for August: Whose Space Is It?

Since the President of the United States directed four US citizens who are elected members of Congress and who are women of color, to go back to where they came from, one reaction has resonated with me deeply. I watch MSNBC daily and I have been struck by the number of on-air pundits of color, of African descent, Caribbean, South Asian, etc., have reported, almost matter-of-factly, that been told both as children and as adults, that they have been subjected to the same taunts. I thought I detected a flash of fury and hurt when some of them responded to the question of whether or not this had ever happened to them, but for the most part, they seemed calm and composed as they described those experiences. Many went further to say that they were often trolled on social media with the same kind of taunts. On a daily basis, we are showing immigrants on our Southern border whose space it is. I think this is the core issue of our time and it is being prosecuted on many levels-in our denomination, in our religious and sectarian institutions, in our neighborhoods, schools and other places.

In 1904, W. E. B. Du Bois said "The problem of the twentieth century is the problem of the color line." In this century, our very lives depend on how we answer the question, "Whose space is it"?

Let's talk.

## **New Day Rising**

On January 26, 2019, fifteen members of our Congregation, including a significant number of Board members, attended the <u>New Day Rising conference</u> at the UU Congregation of Fairfax in Oakton, VA. The conference, sponsored by Central East Region and Fairfax UU, was subtitled "<u>Identifying Your Congregation's Next</u> Steps in the Struggle with White Supremacy Culture." It featured worship from <u>The Sanctuaries DC</u>, workshops run by the UUA, and Ted-talk style presentations from various congregations.

Since that time, attendees have met to discuss ways to continue to explore race with the congregation (e.g., through a monthly curated list of videos, articles, readings; a viewing and discussion of the three-part video series <u>Race: The Power</u> of an Illusion; and a plan for a facilitated reading and discussion of <u>White Fragility</u> by Robin DiAngelo in the fall).

Most recently, a subcommittee was formed to begin crafting a request for proposal for cultural competency training. We want to share the collaborative vision that has been enthusiastically endorsed by the current New Day membership\*:

Our mission is to facilitate the creation of a "brave space" within PBUUC to approach difficult conversations with:

- r Boldness
- r Humility
- ➢ Resilience, and
- ➢ Transparency

If we can do this around Race, what can't we do?

We are now working on a solicitation to invite consultants to propose ways to help us realize this vision. Stay tuned for more information.

#### 2019 Unitarian Universalist Living Legacy Pilgrimage to Alabama, October 19-26, 2019. Come Go With Us To That Land

Rev. Rachel and DARTT Co-Chair Carol Carter Walker will be taking this journey to experience the sites and sights of the most momentous moments in our collective history of civil rights in this country.

The early bird registration deadline is August 14. The early bird cost of \$1,696—covers 8 nights lodging, all meals, bus transportation to all sites, and honoraria for speakers. You are responsible for your own transportation to/from Birmingham. And there are some incidental costs; e.g., housekeeping and bus driver tips. Financial assistance is possible; apply by August 14.

This eight-day journey starts and ends in Birmingham, where the 1963 Ku Klux Klan bombing of the 16th Street Baptist Church killed four little girls. We then travel to Montgomery to the spot where Rosa Parks boarded the bus that changed history, and visit the Equal Justice Initiatives' Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice (Bryan Stevenson's lynching memorial). We'll visit Marion and Selma, Alabama, the center of the Selma Voting Rights Campaign, and walk over the historic Edmund Pettus Bridge. From there, we'll travel to Philadelphia, Mississippi, where members of the Ku Klux Klan killed three civil rights workers. We'll visit the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum in Jackson, then head up the Mississippi Delta to the area where 14-year old Emmett Till was murdered, where Mrs. Fannie Lou Hamer lived and worked, then on to Memphis Tennessee, where the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was assassinated and where the National Civil Rights Museum now honors his legacy and the legacy of all who fought for civil rights.
