Minister's Notes

Dear Members and Friends,

As August ends, we are seeing the end of summer. Turning the calendar to September, the days are sometimes cooler, the humidity is down, and the evenings are lovely and bright. School is starting, the school buses are making their practice runs, schools are welcoming back the teachers and finishing up their construction projects.



Here at Paint Branch, we will have our Ingathering service and water ceremony on September 22, and you might bring some water that is representative of your year's journey in life. What has been your journey? For most of us, the year has included joy and some sorrow, some new beginnings and some grief. We will take a moment to reflect on the year that we have lived, and to consider the year yet to come.

This week, Chris McCann, Chuck Bury and David Chapman and I attended a workshop on addressing racial equity in our UU churches. There were staff from nine UU churches in the DMV area in attendance.

We spoke about creating the Beloved Community in our churches as a journey – the work is never done. We want to be wondering together what has to happen so that each person can bring their whole selves to the community, without difference based on race. What is the shift in our behavior that has to happen? To remember that, as Theresa Inez Soto writes, "all of us need all of us in order to make it."

One of the pieces of this work is deepening relationships – hearing each other's stories and telling our own. Find ways to be brave in order to tell our stories. Begin to know that I make mistakes. Learning how to do it differently, so that I can make some new mistakes.

This is iterative work. Never done. And part of the Journey. Let us make this journey together.

Let us begin.

One of my favorite 🐝 times of year! School supplies, weather turn-

ing reliably cooler (hopefully), kids at the bus stop. It's the "beginning of the church year" in UU circles, meaning that my colleagues and I are scrambling to ensure quality religious education programming. This year, at Paint Branch, we are trying some new things. One Sunday per month we will be providing interest based "studios" for our learners. Cooking, creative and performing arts and a maker's space/ learner's lab will be on offer. We will offer two Sundays of age based, theme based religious exploration classes and one Sunday we will have Re-Imagining Sunday (our multi-generational worship service). We want to make sure that our Re-Imagining Sundays offer depth and opportunities for faith in action for everyone. Our children learn about being UU by BEING UU and a large part of that is being in the company of people who are deeply engaged in our faith. The activities we provide are typically a hands-on object lesson to enhance whatever is happening in worship, and in the coming months, I want to deepen those experiences. 

Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism (BLUU) Invites All to Its First Symposium, October 30 – November, 2, 2019, in Saint Paul, MN

The Harper-Jordan Memorial Symposium* responds to a longing on the part of many Black Unitarian Universalists to more fully understand where we have been, who we are now, and how we hope to live out our Unitarian Universalism as Black people.

This four-day gathering will offer a welcome reception on Wednesday evening; six educative, informative, and interactive plenaries on Thursday and Friday; spiritual grounding and worship experiences that speak directly to our onsite learning; and many meaningful and joy-filled networking and community-building opportunities. We will conclude our time together with a worship service on Saturday morning, open to all, at Unity Church-Unitarian.

We are opening ourselves up to an articulation of Unitarian Universalism that is unapologetically Black and proceeds from our co-creation and co-development, such that we might proclaim and clarify a vision for a Black Unitarian Universalism. There are two unique aspects of this particular BLUU Gathering, as contrasted with earlier ones since its founding in 2015:

- First, BLUU is hosting a gathering that is open to all. Black folks, Indigenous people, People of Color, and white folks.
- Second, BLUU is organizing a symposium-- a formal gathering for people to exchange ideas about and to discuss a particular topic. We will all be in a room together, learning and growing together, and articulating and clarifying a vision for a Black Unitarian Universalism together!

Write Here! Write Now! will be available on the first three Sundays in September. A table with writing materials and letter examples will be in the Meeting House Foyer on Sundays, September 1, 8, and 15. Our community should be proud of the recent decisions that have been made that will positively impact us, long-term. We'd like to highlight two of them.

First, the Board has continued to feel united and pleased with our work towards solidifying the Covenant of Right Relations and a Policy Regarding Destructive Behavior that we started last month. These policies will demonstrate one of our priorities of ensuring all feel welcome and safe in our congregation. Once we have reached a point where the policies fit the vision of our church, there will be opportunities for our community to review the policies and ask questions.

Second, we voted on the proposal from the Kelley Room Redux Committee. The Kelley Room will receive a much needed complete renovation. The renovations will take place during the weekends as our rental schedule allows. We are excited for the opportunity to have a more comfortable and aesthetically pleasing meeting space for our community, tenants, and rental prospects.

There are two other events we're looking forward to this month: Our Board Retreat September 20& 21 and the White Fragility Book Discussions during Enrichment Hour on September 29, October 4, 13, and 20.

All of the congregation are invited to participate in the White Fragility Book Discussions.
