# **Minister's Notes**

### Dear Members and Friends,

I just returned from a pilgrimage to Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee. Carol Carter Walker and I went on this Living Legacy trip to learn more and experience the stories of the civil rights movement. We spent a week on



the bus with over forty people visiting key sites throughout the south. It was intense and emotional and moving. Although most of the people who were active in the Movement have died, we had the privilege of meeting several who were involved at the time, and many others who are committed to telling the story. Carol and I will be leading worship based on this trip on December 1, right after Thanksgiving.

I think that as a nation we need to do a better job of telling the history of slavery, of the civil rights movement, and of the continuing efforts to deny that history. Until we do so we will not be able to come to terms with the dark parts of our history, and we will all remain injured from the ways in which we are or were complicit or affected. It is in the social fabric of our lives, whether white or black, and like the water in which we swim, we cannot see it without some guides and education.

May we keep learning. May we take the opportunities to learn and grow when they present themselves. May we have the courage to talk with each other when we find we are surprised or don't understand something. May it be so.

### **Board of Trustees**

#### Dear Congregation,

Before discussing what's been going on in terms of Board activities, there are a couple of announcements about Board personnel. We are sorry to report that Noel Monardes has resigned from the Board. This was Noel's third time serving this church as a Board member. His quiet resolve, careful consideration of issues, and knowledgeable input will be sorely missed. This means, however, that the Nominating Committee will be considering nominees for the open Board position. Please consider saying "yes" if you are tapped, or consider volunteering to serve.

Also, as many of you know, Eric Most is recovering from a surgical procedure, so will not be among us for a while. We wish him a stress-free and speedy healing process.

October was a busy month at our church. The Board has been moving forward with the two governance documents—the Covenant of Right Relations and the Destructive Behavior Policy. We scheduled three listening sessions to give you a chance to voice your thoughts about the documents. The feedback was extremely helpful. We heard your praise for the work that's already been done as well as your concerns and suggestions about how these document can be improved and how they will be implemented. Our next step it to review and compile all of your comments, categorize them in terms of the specific issues they address, then submit that compilation to you along with the revised documents by mid-November. The final step will be putting the documents forward for you to vote on. Please stay tuned for updates.

The New Entrance Committee also held listening sessions, offering us all a chance to speak directly to the architects and offer input in terms of design elements and specific needs. Moreover, the Auction Committee has been hard at work developing a calendar of events. Also, the Stewardship Committee will soon be launching the pledge drive, so keep your ears open for more news. All of these and so many more efforts by so many hard-working volunteers generate the fuel to keep our church running.

At our October Board meeting, we discussed not only the activities mentioned above, among many things, but we also addressed issues brought to our attention by members of the congregation. For example, Carol Carter-Walker offered an agenda item that suggested a means to improve communications among the many committees and activity groups here at PBUUC. At issue is the coordination of calendars so that activities are not competing for time and space. One of her suggestions, which had been adopted by a previous Board, is to establish a Church Council of committee and activity group chairs or representatives to work together to coordinate efforts and share resources. This Board also approved this suggestion. Ebony Contreras has volunteered to spearhead that effort. Also, please note, the Board is looking for a few good people to serve as Process Observers! Are you at all curious about what goes on at Board meetings? Would you be willing to work to keep us on track and forward thinking as we wrestle with church issues? Board meetings follow a process intended to ensure that we treat each other with respect, wait to be acknowledged before speaking, take turns to speak and not interrupt each other, keep to time limits, etc. Throughout the meeting, the Process Observer notes when the proceedings are going well and when they are not. At the end of the meeting, the Process Observer has a few minutes to summarize the behavior, identifying instances of transgression, so that the group can learn from them and improve its functioning. Examples of what might be shared are:

How well discussion flowed and the extent to which all participants were engaged and contributing.

- $\Rightarrow$  Side conversations or other distractions.
- ⇒ The emotional tone of the meeting: Was it tense, supportive, etc.?
- $\Rightarrow$  Was the agenda followed?
- $\Rightarrow$  Were participants well prepared?
- $\Rightarrow$  Were comments appropriate and thoughtful?

We are asking for 4 to 5 volunteers so that each person would observe only once every 4 to 5 months. If you would be willing to take in this role, please send an email to <u>bot@pbuuc.org</u> to let us know.

### MULTIGENERATIONAL RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Each year, around this time, I begin to consider the STUFF. The stuff that has accumulated in my home. The boxes that travel with me from place to place and are almost never opened and put away. The books and yarn from which I cannot bear to part, the clothes still bearing tags, the aspirational office supplies still tidy in their packaging. Aaron and I have determined that we live comfortably in about 600 square feet of our roughly 1220 square foot home. So what's with that extra footage? That's where the STUFF lives. An entire room of our home is dedicated to STUFF that we very rarely see, let alone use.

And have you seen my office at church? So much stuff. Most of it fun and useful and flung around the room in no particular order. I'm practically buried in the accoutrements that most religious educators inherit and acquire along with their job description. I am in the process of finding some sense of order in there. Melissa Graham (the chair of the MRE team) and I took a day over the summer to begin clearing out loads of stuff from our space in the basement of the RE building, as well as from our classrooms. It's ongoing work and I see progress being made.

As I contemplate the STUFF that surrounds me, in my home and my office, I begin to think about being far more intentional about what I keep and how and where I keep it. I'm not sure any of us intends to collect so much and that's the rub. As a Unitarian Universalist, I am called to be intentional in a lot of areas of my life, and that should absolutely include my personal space and belongings. What do I mean to have? How do I mean to live in terms of the space I'm utilizing?

This brings me to our shared spaces at Paint Branch. How can we begin to think about our space as a means to reflect our values? What do we MEAN to have and how do we MEAN to use it? I'd love for us to bring that spirit to our conversations with the architect as we dream and plan the best use of our space. Are we using our space to its highest good for ourselves and our larger community? Does the use of our indoor space reflect our UU values? How can we be in right relationship with our spaces when we consider what we keep and how we keep it? Join me in discerning what values we want to reflect with the way we treat our physical spaces.

### DARTT OpEd for November: <u>A letter to my beloved community</u>

For the past few months I have been concerned about the direction in which Paint Branch (we) is (are) going with regard to interpersonal interactions. At the last town hall some suggestions were made and I believe one way in which the current BOT is responding has been to put forth two new documents that are designed to help improve the situation. Still I continue to be concerned that even these documents are not enough. We need to actively engage in changing our behavior. Some of you may remember when I brought to the attention of those gathered that we had witnessed an example of white privilege and that we had all been participants in letting it pass. We were complicit. I believe that "let it pass" has become the way we interact. That is, we don't challenge what we see and hear, even when we know, or at least sense, something is wrong.

We have all heard the mantra, "If you see something, say something." Are we saying something? We also have heard on the news and in our social media feeds about the dangers of bullying. One often overlooked danger where bullying is concerned is the role of the bystander, especially the passive bystander. This is the person who is seeing (or hearing or reading) something hurtful and saying (or doing) nothing. The silence and/or inaction of a passive bystander provides the bully with the silent acceptance they need to continue. Silence equals assent.

Why might someone choose to "let it pass"? Perhaps they don't want to be next, perhaps they don't feel empowered to do something meaningful, perhaps they don't think it is their right or duty to get involved or perhaps they believe someone else is going to take care of it. In our case, I believe race may also play a factor at times. We have been openly struggling with issues around race and, it seems people are afraid to speak up if the interactions are cross-racial for fear they may be seen as racially insensitive or as racially inappropriate, or worse yet, called a racist.

Beloved community, it's time to make a change! In healthy, well-functioning groups, there are few passive bystanders, if any. People communicate directly, effectively and in a loving way, but they don't tolerate bullying; they don't witness it and they don't let it pass. I challenge us to become actively engaged. (Who is more activist than a UU?) If someone says or writes or does something hurtful, don't remain silent. Don't expect someone else to speak up... Be the change agent. We owe it to ourselves and each other.
