Minister's Notes

Dear Members and Friends,

The year is coming to an end. The weather is changing and the days are getting shorter as we approach the winter solstice. The sunshiny days are spectacular with bright blue sky and still-beautiful trees, as they continue to drop their leaves. Any bets as to when we get the first significant snowstorm? Our work with the architects is ongoing, imagining a new entrance and other improvements to the church. I know people are excited about this work, and about the proposals that are forthcoming. Come to our Congregational Meeting on December 15 to hear their presentation, and let's imagine what we might do for our facilities and our community.

Also on the agenda for the Congregational Meeting are the two documents the Board is recommending for approval. The Covenant of Right Relations and the Destructive Behaviors Policy offer a way to recognize that as a community we will be healthier if we articulate expectations and boundaries for ourselves and our members. None of us is perfect. We are all fallible as humans. These documents help us to realize that we all fall short of how we want to be with each other. They also help us know that there are ways to come back into covenant, back into good relationship with each other. Revised versions of the documents are available from the church's website with printed copies in Meeting House Foyer.

A light lunch will be served at the Congregational Meeting. All are invited, but only Members will be able to vote. The Meeting will begin at 11:30 am, right after the Choir Service.

At the urging of the Board, we have enabled giving by text and are again publicizing the option for giving online, using your phone or computer. See additional details elsewhere in this issue. Information will be provided regularly in the Bulletin.

We have been working all year to bring issues of Race to the forefront of Paint Branch. Fifteen of us attended New Day Rising, learning about dismantling White Supremacy. Since then, we have offered worship services, a book discussion group, workshops for staff, and open drop-in discussions. We are not done, but we have made a beginning. May we each find a way to engage and learn and begin to be not just not racist, but actively anti-racist.



May you take time during the changing of the year to rest, to take care of yourself, to laugh a little, and to celebrate.

Board of Trustees

Dear Congregation,

The Board held a rather lively meeting in November. We had much ground to cover.

Members of the Minister's Mediation Team (Reverend Rachel, Deborah Rubenstein, and Paul Weston; Evangeline Wells did not attend) joined us to offer an update on their progress. As we've reported before, the idea for mediation was proposed at last June's annual meeting by Carol Carter-Walker and Leo Jones. The Team reported that they are in the process of doing research to find which, among the many restorative practice formats, is most suitable for PBUUC. Because there are multiple formats, figuring out just which one will best suit our needs is proving to be complicated. The team will continue their research and to report their progress.

Elaine Shell, Chair of the Finance Committee, also joined us as the Board reviewed the new PBUUC Finance Manual written by Elaine with help from the Finance Committee; Tess Morrison, PBUUC Treasurer; Dave Nation, Assistant Treasurer; Chuck Bury, PBUUC Administrator; and Hannah Oshin, Bookkeeper and Administrative Assistant. The Board voted on several policy questions that help clarify specific issues related to money management. The Manual, though still in draft stage, incorporates all the elements of managing finances for our church. Once finalized by the Finance Committee, it will be available to the congregation to use.

John Barr has been selected by the Nominating Committee to fill a vacant seat on the Legacy Fund Committee, and the Board unanimously approved. Congratulations, John. So far, however, there is no nominee to fill the Board vacancy left by the departure of Noel Monardes. The Nominating Committee is still looking. If you have been wanting to join the exciting world of service to our church as a member of the PBUUC Board of Trustees to complete Noel's term in office (ending this coming June) please contact the Nominating Committee at <u>NomCom@pbuuc.org</u>. And remember that we are still hoping to find process observers for Board meetings (see November Branches). We are asking for 4 to 5 volunteers so that each person would observe only once every 4 to 5 months. If you would be willing to take in this role, please send an email to <u>bot@pbuuc.org</u>.

The majority of the November meeting conversation involved the proposed Covenant of Right Relations and proposed Destructive Behavior Policy. After presenting the documents to the congregation in early October, the Board of Trustees held three listening sessions wherein members of the congregation asked questions and offered comments on the documents. The Board also accepted written comments offering feedback on the policy documents. Following the listening sessions, a subcommittee of the board that included Janet Overton, Kathi Yu, and Melissa Graham reviewed all feedback the Board received and incorporated many of the congregation's suggestions and ideas into an updated draft. The revised documents will be voted on for adoption by the wider membership at the Congregational Meeting on December 15th. You can review the documents now by clicking on the links for the Covenant of Right Relations and the Destructive Behavior Policy.

We also acknowledge comments made during the listening sessions and in the written comments that address the role that white supremacy culture plays in our interactions with each other as well as the systems and organizational processes under which we operate, including these policies. We note that social conditioning plays a part in how we interact. We are committed to continued transparency and growth as we work, through our social action teams and efforts, to interrupt these processes at Paint Branch.

As for the December 15 Congregational Meeting, Board members Wendy Schlegel, Carol Boston, and Kathi Yu volunteered to plan the meeting. In

addition to the vote on the policy documents, another important element of that meeting will be the unveiling of the architects' proposals for creating our new church entrance and other building improvements. On Sunday October 20th, the New Entrance Build Design Committee held a listening session with the architects and the congregation to allow us to convey to the architects what is most important to us in the new design plans. A fairly large group of people attended and offered their visions and ideas. On December 15th, a variety of options that incorporate some of those visions and ideas will be available for us to view and discuss. Lunch and childcare will be provided. The meeting will take place after Sunday service, so please plan to stay and participate as we meet together to make plans for our future.

Speaking of our future, Don Gerson has volunteered to lead a Capital Campaign to raise the funds for our new church entrance and building improvements. As we discuss our options on December 15th, we will also need to be mindful of the cost of our options and plans. As we approach the giving season, please think also about our church home and our hopes for it and us in the coming years.

A New Look for the New Year in the Kelley Room

We are pleased to be able to share some exciting news with everyone. Work to renovate both sides of the Kelley Room is ready to move forward! Between Monday, December 30th, 2019 and Wednesday, January 15th, JOA Real Estate Group will perform many refurbishments recommended by the Kelley Room Redux Committee and approved by the Board of Trustees. These refurbishments include new paint, new lighting, acoustic sound-absorbing panels and new flooring.

Our journey to this point began in May when a committee was formed to take a good look at the Kelley Room and suggest improvements.

Over several months the committee consulted with the staff, committee representatives and interested members of the congregation who use the Kelley Room for a variety of activities. The committee met with a sound engineer and a professional construction expert. They also did considerable online research to gather pricing for an assortment of options.

When a list of priorities was developed, the committee received a generous offer of in-kind services that would make it possible for us to see improvements accomplished in a very timely manner. This offer required additional funding, which has been wholeheartedly supported by several members of the congregation.

We are looking forward to sharing the new look in the Kelley Room with you.

Kwanzaa is a holiday that celebrates family, community, and culture, primarily but not exclusively celebrated by people of the African Diaspora. It was created in 1966 by Dr. Maulana Karenga, a professor of Africana Studies. Kwanzaa as a seven-day cultural festival that begins December 26 and ends January 1. Kwanzaa is a Swahili word, inspired by African "first fruit" traditions. This celebration has garnered interest from many UUs because of its coherence between the seven principles of both Kwanzaa and Unitarian Universalism. Welcoming Congregation Renewal Program Has A Leader. Will Launch Soon

In the 1980s and 90s, when the word "welcoming" became a code word for lesbian, gay, and bisexual people, the Unitarian Universalist Association launched a Welcoming Congregation Program to help us learn how to undo homophobia—and later, transphobia (prejudice against transgender people)—in our hearts and minds, our congregations and communities.

Paint Branch completed the UUA's program and was certified as a Welcoming Congregation in 1994.

In recognition that the work of welcome is never done, the UUA has launched a Welcoming Congregation Renewal Program. This new program provides up-to-date and expanded resources so we can continue to learn about how to be truly welcoming to all people.

Eric Eldritch, the visionary who organized and led the November Transgender Day of Remembrance and Resilience Service at Paint Branch, has agreed to lead the Welcoming Congregation Renewal Program at Paint Branch. The Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) has had this initiative in its work planning for about a year and already has members and friends committed to working on this initiative. DARTT Launching New Leadership Model /Recruiting New Leadership by Carol Carter Walker

DARTT discussed transitions of leadership and changes to its leadership model at its July, August, and November meetings.

A Core Group of up to three members who serve as an Advisory Council to the Leadership.

Leadership Recruitment:

We are recruiting for the positions of Chair, 1st Vice Chair, and up to three members to form the CORE Group.

Special Collections for December SAC Special Collection December 8, 2019

The SAC Special Collection recipient for December 8, 2019 is Cagayan State University (CSU) in the Philippines. It is a public university with seven campuses in Cagayan Provence of the Philippines. It offers undergraduate and graduate courses of study in a broad range of majors including education, business, hospitality management, allied health services, agriculture, veterinary medicine, the sciences, mathematics, and law. Most of the students at CSU are from poor families and are the first in their family to attend college. Recently PBUUC member Abby Crowley spent seven months at CSU as part of her Peace Corps service. While she was there, she realized that some of the pedagogy she was training faculty to use was dependent on technology they did not have. This SAC Special Collection will help fund LCD projectors and monitors for ten classrooms at the Andrews Campus in Tuguegarao. Thank you for your donation!

SAC Special Collection December 24, 2019 The SAC Special Collection for December 24, 2019 is for PBUUC's continued participation in the Warm Nights and Community Café programs. During the two Christmas Eve Services the entire proceeds of the collections will be dedicated to our programs serving people with critical housing and food needs. This includes hosting Warm Nights and funding food costs for the PBUUC volunteers at the Hyattsville 'Community Café' that hosts other churches who provide hot lunches for persons in need. The other program is the Prince Georges County Hyperthermia Program—Warm Nights Homeless Emergency Shelter overseen by the Community Crisis Services Inc. (CCSI). Prince Georges churches, including ours, provide homeless men, women, and children a place to spend one week during the winter months (mid-November to April) giving them a place to sleep, a hot home-made dinner and breakfast, and a bag lunch to start their day.
