# **Notes from the Minister**

This has been a big year for me.

I was ordained as a Unitarian Universalist minister, and searched for and was called by a congregation. I completed a year-long residency as a Chaplain in a hospital in Florida. On the last day of my residency, the moving van packed up



our home of 30 years, and we moved with two cats to Maryland. We bought a house, and are learning that we can feel cozy, even when it is 30 out.

As we look forward to next year, it, too will be a big year. This time we will do it together. I am grateful to be walking with you into this next "big year." We will celebrate special days together. We will watch our children grow and welcome new members. We will have a successful stewardship drive during the month of March. We will have an Installation of your new Minister on May 6 (Save the Date!) We will continue to work on diversity, inclusion and relationships. We will have a Flower Ritual, laugh together, cry together, and perhaps picnic together.

# **Board of Trustees**

From the Board Chair,

The end of the year is a good time to look back to see how things have gone. In my opinion, the Board of Trustees has worked very hard for the last six months and is doing a good job of listening, both to each other and to everyone in the congregation. We have instituted a new routine to our meetings to think about "big questions," a suggestion that I obtained from a leadership training from the denomination this past fall. Please know that all the Trustees are trying to hear what you all want from church. We want to be aware of your thoughts, from small issues to big ones. Contact us, during coffee hour, meetings of various groups, or by calling or e-mailing any one of us.

When the BOT began this church year in July, we came in knowing that the fiscal health of the church was difficult to ascertain. The financial reports were hard to read, there were labels that made no sense, and some of the line items in the budget could not be interpreted. The newly constituted Finance Committee have asked many questions and have been working at answering every one of them. What we know is that we had a few unusual budget items, such as settling a new minister, and so we are in a lean year. The Finance Committee will be using the suggestions obtained during a process audit of our books to suggest changes for the Board to review. And we hope that our next Stewardship drive will be outstanding.

The Board hopes that everyone attends the **Ministerial Start-up workshop**, scheduled for January 21st right after service. A UUA consultant will be here to facilitate the workshop to talk about who we are, where we want to go, and how the minister will work with us to get there. The BOT is planning no midyear congregational meeting in the hope that you will attend this event.

# The Word of the Year A Non-Resolution for the New Year

New Year's resolutions are not my thing. My resolve dwindles before the 30-day trial gym membership expires, the beautiful blank book that was to be my daily gratitude journal sits empty on my nightstand. Still, I have this ongoing desire to be"out with the old and in with the new" and each turning of the year feels like an opportunity for renewal and improvement. Happily, I've discovered an alternative to way to honor that inner yearning by choosing a guide word for the year. A life coach friend of mine introduced me to this idea about five years ago, and I've chosen one each January since.

My word of the year expresses a quality I want to bring more fully into my life. Each year, it plays out differently-the word itself, how often I refer to it and in what way, how meaningful it becomes, and how much change it motivates. Sometimes the word, like "courage" in a particularly rough year, becomes a mantra to which I cling each morning. And then, the year I chose "truth," the effect was nebulous, truthfully. Still, there were "moments of truth" that year ,in which I grew a greater awareness of the process of discerning truth and the priority of remaining true to myself.

How to choose a word? There must be many ways, but mine has been to think about the traits of the kind of person I would like to be; aspects of self I wish to develop; and jot them down. I may be riveted on one word immediately. Or, I might circle three words, and let them percolate for a day or two while I toss them around. Or, even as I resist it, the word may choose me.

The latter seems to be true for me this year. The word "integrity" has come up in several different contexts recently. I am a little afraid of this one, to be truthful. It is challenging me to "walk the walk;" to live true to my values - to avoid over-compromising, and to make well-considered decisions. This accountability to myself makes me want to run the other direction screaming! Which may be exactly why this word, integrity, chose me.

How you apply your word, and hold it in your awareness, is up to you. Jot it on sticky notes to post near your mirror, on your calendar, on your laptop... take the time to medi-



tate upon it, journal about it, use it as a lens for daily reflections. The point is to keep your attention focused, drawing it back to the word from time to time so that it will develop

greater clarity and depth as the year unfolds. It is yours to explore what works for you; though as in most things, we get out of it what we've put in.

Which word might guide you into greater awareness, new choices, and perhaps, even, some transformation of consciousness and new ways of being in the world, over the course of the next year?

# **PBUUC News and Notes**

#### Have you noticed our new thermostats?

PEPCO has installed new programmable thermostats throughout our buildings, to help us maintain comfortable temperatures when we are using the space, and not to heat or cool the spaces when we don't need to. In addition, there are now two thermostats in the Meeting House Sanctuary. This is because the thermostatic control of the two units serving the meeting house are now separated, and will function better. All these new thermostats are programmed so that on-site intervention will be needed less often. Our intention is to be both financially and environmentally responsible, and heat occupied spaces to 68° in the winter, and cool them to 76° in the summer. If you are someone who wants to know how to adjust the thermostats, please let us know! Training on the thermostats is available. Just ask Chuck or one of the Building Managers.

# Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team

#### Still Time to Submit Personal Testimony to the UUA

The Board of Trustees of the UUA appointed a Commission on Institutional Change last Spring. The Commission is charged with long-term cultural and institutional change that redeems the essential promise and ideals of Unitarian Universalism. Its focus is an analysis of structural racism and white supremacy within the UUA.

The Commission wants to hear from <u>all</u> of us because oppression hurts everyone including those who appear to be its beneficiaries. Here are the personal testimony guidelines.

The Commission on Institutional Change requests personal accounts and stories about how racism has affected individuals and groups within Unitarian Universalism at the personal, institutional, or systemic levels. It is seeking to document incidents that occurred between individual Unitarian Universalists, within a congregational or Associational setting, or as a result of whitecenteredness embedded within the greater Unitarian Universalist culture. Within this context, the Commission asks you to respond to the following questions with specific examples:

- In what ways have you or your group or community been hurt by current racist and culturally biased attitudes and practices within Unitarian Universalism?
- In what ways have we, as a faith community, been living outside of our values and commitments?

No information provided will be shared with attribution without the prior consent of the author.

# The Wider Unitarian **Universalist Universe**



#### **Our Famous UU for January:**

Olympia Brown (January 5, 1835-October 23, 1926) dedicated her life to opening doors for women. Among only a handful of women to graduate from college, she received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Antioch in 1860

and three years later became the first woman graduate of a regularly established theological school: St. Lawrence University. She was ordained a Universalist minister, the first woman to achieve full ministerial standing recognized by a denomination. As a young minister, she took an active role in the women's suffrage movement and was one of the few original suffragists who lived to vote in the 1920 presidential election.

In her later years she spent summers at her lakeside home in Racine and winters in Baltimore with her daughter Gwendolen, who taught Greek and Latin at the Bryn Mawr School there. She died in Baltimore at 91 and was buried beside her husband in Racine's Mound Cemetery.

At the time of her death, The Baltimore Sun captured the independence, fearlessness and passionate commitment to justice of the Reverend Olympia Brown by stating; "Perhaps no phase of her life better exemplified her vitality and intellectual independence than the mental discomfort she succeeded in arousing, between her eightieth and ninetieth birthdays, among the conservatively minded Baltimorans."
