

Musings from the Board of Trustees Chair

This has been a very busy month for the Board. We held a full day retreat at the beginning of the month as well as our normal meeting on the 3rd Tuesday of the month. In general, we are gaining momentum in working through items that need to be addressed as well as thinking about what we want to work on during the rest of the year.

During our retreat, we agreed to a goal of doing more work on higher level questions. While some other business might not always allow that, it is a goal. We identified four different sets of topics from which to choose a specific question to discuss each month. Those topics were visioning of the church's mission/place in the community, board interactions, money issues, and church committee organization and staffing. As I write this out, it is obvious that we will probably not have the time to come to conclusive ending during our discussions about any of these items. On the other hand, we will get ideas rolling, and hopefully bring those thoughts back to the congregation at large.

I am sure there will be another article in this newsletter to talk about the stewardship campaign. I want to bring it up in this space as well. Our church is what we make of it. We have a new minister who I personally is having a positive influence on us. We have many other staff members who take care of f the major needs of our organization: administration, building management, childcare, running of a religious education program, music, dance. We have a building on a beautiful piece of land, a building that needs tending to and repair from time to time. Based on what I heard during the ministerial start-up workshop, many members of the congregation have good memories and feelings about what has happened in the past, even though there were also difficult times. Given all of that, I encourage every member to consider what the church provides to them, the rest of the congregation and the community we serve when you think about how much you can pledge for the coming year. The reality is that our congregation needs both your time and your financial contributions to operate to the fullest extent.

Service and Panel Discussion Commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Kerner Commission Report

Sunday, March 25, PBUUC joins universities and cities across America commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the release of the Report of the National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders. Rev. Christensen will lead the morning service, reflecting on the devastation of poverty in our nation. After an informal reception, a panel discussion will be moderated by Dr. Carolyn Byerly, PBUUC member and Chair of the Department of Communication, Culture, and Media Studies, School of Communications at Howard University.

The panel will address policing, poverty, the press, and the millennial-generation perspective on the Report's recommendations in terms of race relations today. There will be a Q&A and commentary session after the discussion.

Finance Committee

The PBUUC Finance Committee is having a good time this year. Our membership includes myself, Anita Williams, Jeanne Contardo, Marilyn Pearl and Patty Daukantus; plus our Treasurers, Louise Waugh and Dave Nation; and our BOT Liaison, Kathi Yu. Rachel has also been actively supporting our team. We began the year in October with a review of the independent Auditor's Process Review recommendations. We created thirteen Actions to ourselves as the result of the report. Probably the most challenging item is to develop a PBUUC Finances Manual, which will document and organize all of the church processes into a single, integrated on-line system - with hyperlinks from the Manual to the individual process descriptions. We are working toward a review of each PBUUC financial-related document, updating it appropriately (with all relevant parties), and getting each document formally Approved. The result will provide a Baseline of how each element of PBUUC finances is to be done. And each process will be easily located on-line for reference. This will not be completed this fiscal year.

Our most intense initiative is getting our accounting database updated. Over time, as the church grew and needed new line items and subentries for various new reasons, financial data was entered into areas of the database that seemed to make sense at the time. But over time the 'sense' of some entries was no longer logical resulting in somewhat confusing readability of the Treasurer's Reports – e.g. an attempt to enter Pledges into the database several years ago had some side-effects (other UUA churches had similar results when trying to track pledges in QuickBooks for Non-Profits). We created a number of actions related to the database line items. Chuck is working with the Bookkeeper to 'back-out' each entry that does not represent our current church business. He is doing this such that each change is done onestep-at-a-time – creating traceability for each change. The Finance Committee is enthused about the progress being made. In the process we have confirmed our bank accounts, our operating funds and our liabilities. PBUUC is in pretty good financial health at the moment. We don't expect that any of the corrections to our database will impact that assessment. On a related note, Jeanne Contardo (who works with non-profits), has drafted a new Financial Statement format for us; which will eventually replace the current Treasurer's Profit and Loss Report. Even changing the terminology from Profit and Loss will be useful.

Under the current law, developers have to replant only one tree for every four removed and, with a certain credit, the replanting percentage can drop even lower.
