Notes from the Minister

At the end of July, Eric and I will drive up to New Hampshire for a few days. My father grew up in Durham, where his father was a philosophy professor at the University. His parents bought a family burial plot there, and several years ago my family gathered there to bury his ashes. It was small, just us kids and my mom, and one nephew.

We stayed in a local hotel, and while we were there we realized that the home my father grew up in was just two blocks away. We wandered the neighborhood, and my sister remembered playing in that back yard, hanging laundry, and remembered the rear door to the cellar. We reconnected with the place and the stories and the roots.

This year we go back again. This year we take my mom's ashes to the family plot. All of my Dad's siblings have now died. All of my mom's siblings have died. She is the last of that generation, of that family.

And this year there will be almost 40 of us gathering. Us kids, plus several of the grandkids and even the next generation. And cousins – and more kids. We will gather to honor the generations. We will tell stories, and laugh and maybe cry, and eat together. We will wander the neighborhood and see if we can find the family house again.

I think about the generations and what I know. As a kid, we visited the farm in Kansas where Grand Herby was born in a sod house, and we heard the stories of his father. We'll call him the first generation.

We will see the house where Grand Anna and Grand Herby lived. Generation #2.

The lives of my parents, Carolyn and Ralph; Generation #3 Their four children, and nieces and nephews; Generation #4

Some of their fifteen grandchildren; Generation #5

Some of the great grandchildren; Generation #6

And at least one of those great grandchildren, Zack, is a young adult living with his girlfriend in Atlanta. His child, whenever that may happen, will be Generation #7. I can see it from here. Seven generations turns out not to be so remote, so mysterious. What am I doing to act on behalf of the seventh generation? What will they find of this world? Let us begin.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2018 GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST ASSOCIATION: ALL ARE CALLED, KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI

General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists meeting to learn, sing, witness, and worship together. Most attendees are from the 1,000 congregations in North America. There are also attendees from Africa, Asia, Central and South America. In order to vote on the business of GA, you must be a delegate. However, anyone can register and attend. You can attend in-person or offsite.

This year, Paint Branch elected the following four delegates: Carmelita Carter-Sykes, Eric Christensen, Tricia Most, and Carol Carter Walker. Rev. Rachel Christensen was a Ministerial Delegate, meaning not elected by the congregation, but by virtue of her position.

The July 22 Sunday Service featured personal reflections on our GA experience by the delegates as well as the perspective of a non-attendee provided by Worship Associate Elizabeth Porter.

Community Justice Project

Thanks so much to everyone who contributed to the June 10 Special Collection for the Community Justice Project. As a result of your generous contributions and a Legacy Fund grant, Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church will be building on its history as a social-justice making congregation.

This fall, we will be embarking on an exciting new year-long justice project aimed at getting to know our neighbors, learning about the critical issues affecting them and finding places where we can partner with them, other faith communities and non-profit organizations to improve our community.

Rev. Karen Lee Scrivo, a Prince George's County community minister focusing on justice issues, will be creating and guiding this new project, with input from Rev. Rachel Christensen and the congregation. We will begin by learning more about the people, neighborhoods, land use, places and institutions near the Meeting House. We will then study Paint Branch's history, particularly where it has answered the call of justice. From there, the congregation will use the gathered information to better focus its future justice work in the community.

The project's approach is based on Karen's training and experience in faith-based community ministry. Karen is a member of Gamaliel, a national faith-based organizing group and its local Prince George's County affiliate, PRISCM (Partnership for Renewal in Southern and Central Maryland.). She is also working with the Coalition for Community Empowerment and Police Accountability Coalition of Prince George's County (CEPA-PGC) and Dress for Success in Washington, DC.

Karen asked Paint Branch to be the first congregation to test this new program because of its long-standing commitment to social justice work that dates back to the congregation's founding some 64 years ago. Drawing on her past as a lifespan religious educator, Karen is committed to making this a multi-generational project in which children, youth and their families will be important partners.

Karen is very grateful for the early and enthusiastic support for the project from Rachel and the congregation's Board of Trustees, Legacy Fund, Social Action Committee, DARTT co-chair Carol Carter Walker and outgoing religious educator Carla Miller.

The project is off to a great start thanks to you and the Legacy Fund. The Legacy Endowment Committee agreed to match total contributions up to \$2,500, and we're al-

most there. The June 10 Special Collection netted a total of \$2,428. Here's the breakdown: Collection Plate: \$1,708 and Pledges: \$720.

What an amazing start! Additional contributions will be gratefully accepted. Indicate they are to support the Community Social Justice Project.

Rachel and Karen have been already meeting to begin planning for the project's kickoff this September. The first step is creating a Steering Team to lead the project and gather input from the rest of the congregation. The team's work will begin with defining the physical parameters of the study area around Paint Branch.

Watch for regular updates in the congregation's newsletter, weekly updates, announcements and Face Book page. In the meantime, thanks for your support and looking forward to a transforming journey with you.

Parking Lot Update

According to a representative of Corvius Construction Company, the firm that will actually construct our stormwater management plan, part of which includes paving the parking lot, the expected start date for construction has now been moved back to June, 2019. Since this project will be entirely funded by the Clean Water Act fee collected by the county, we have little say in the matter. PBUUC remains exempt from this fee as it has been since we entered the program in 2016.

Social Action Committee

In our effort to coordinate and encourage the efforts of the PBUUC community to bring about a more just society, the Social Action Committee (SAC) meets monthly to find ways PBUUC can work to meet the needs of disadvantaged people locally, nationally, and globally.

Special Collections: One way we try to help PBUUC bring about a more just society is by taking a monthly Special Collection for a group or organization working to improve the lives of others. The July 29 collection was for the Anti-Defamation League. The August Special Collection will for the Archie Elliott Scholarship Fund. On June 18, 1993, shortly after 5 pm, after being pulled over by the police for speeding, Archie Elliott III (26) was shot by police officers while handcuffed, hands behind his back, and sitting in a police cruiser with both the lap belt and shoulder harness on. He was shot 14 times. The Archie Elliott III Scholarship Fund was founded and is operated by Dorothy Copp Elliott in honor of her son. The money is awarded to Prince George's County high school seniors to attend an Historically Black College or University (HBCU). Last year Mrs. Elliott was able to award two \$2,500 scholarships.

Monthly Film Series: Last year the chairs of the three social justice groups, SAC, DARTT, and the Green Team, decided to develop a monthly film series. A Legacy Fund grant allowed us to buy equipment to be used for this initiative. This fall, the PBUUC Social Justice Coalition will bring you (imagined trumpet fanfare) The PBUUC Conscientious Projector Film Series! Once a month beginning this September, one of the Coalition groups will feature a film on Sunday afternoon at 1 pm (or earlier, depending on the program). Light lunch fare will be available before the film screening.

Special Monthly Initiative. There is no shortage of human rights issues or causes to be championed. So many people need help to simply get by every day. Each month SAC will focus on a specific issue and local organization working to address that problem. During our August meeting we will look at the work of The InterFaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington (IFC). Created in 1978, the IFC brings together eleven historic faith communities to promote dialogue, understanding and a sense of community and to work cooperatively for justice throughout the DC region (read more at their website https://ifcmw.org/about-us/).

On Saturday, September 16, the IFC will hold its 13th Annual Interfaith Unity Walk. "Each September, we walk along 'Embassy Row' on Massachusetts Ave., NW, and visit houses of worship and other religious centers in a public celebration of solidarity among different faiths and cultures in our region." The walk is from 1:45 pm to 6 pm.

Walkers will meet at the Washington Hebrew Congregation, 3935 Macomb St NW, Washington, DC 20016. Special performers include The Cathedral Band and more.

If interfaith unity is something that speaks to your heart, please join us at our August SAC meeting. We hope to form a group of PBUUCers who will want to take this walk with IFC. We will also be discussing the Beloved Community Interfaith Network; Marge Owens and Marj Donn continue to be involved in this group.
