I feel like I am reeling from the state of the world right now. The fires in California and the huge number of hurricanes, both clearly affected and made more prevalent by Global Warming. Continuing protests about the risk of living while Black, and the dribbling out of news from one city after another about a Black man who was killed in police custody. On-going violence or suggestions of violence, claiming it in the name of law and order, when the actions of such violence are the antithesis of law and order. Active efforts to limit who gets to vote, to undermine voter confidence in the voting process, and to limit the counting of mail-in ballots. Threats to the peaceful transition of power and the office of the Presidency, and the corresponding planning of what to do if that appears to manifest. The rush to confirm a new Supreme Court Justice so that the sitting court will be in place to rule on the outcome of and potential challenge to the election. Ongoing deaths from Coronavirus, and still no clear overall policy to limit its spread and docu-

Whew! It is sometimes overwhelming and we each have to find a way to cope. I see an analogy here to Ebony Contreras' sermon, where she urged us to engage Black Lives Matter one person, one neighborhood at a time. Find one thing you can do, one thing I can do, to engage with the state of the world and act to move things to a more positive standing.

We bought a flag. We bought and mounted an American Flag and hung it on our porch, because it seemed to me that the image of patriotism has been politicized and is being used divisively. I wanted to provide a demonstration of our hope and belief in our American system of laws and voting. We hung the flag next to a sign supporting my preferred candidate for President. Two flags, two images. One small thing we have done. Not enough, not all, but something.

May you find your way to doing something to help you find a place of hope and possibility in your life in the days and weeks to come.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Happy Fall Members and Friends of Paint Branch,

As we enter into the fall season, we welcome Reverend Rachel back from her vacation and look forward to this year's annual auction beginning in a few weeks. We hope that you all will join us for one or more of the virtual auction sessions. It is a time of fun and fellowship for our Paint Branch family. It is also an important fundraiser for our congregation. Our first virtual auction in the spring was a big success, and I expect that this one will be just as fabulous. We thank all those helping to make this annual event happen.

This month the Board of Trustees continued to discuss when and how we will begin to hold small meetings of members at Paint Branch. At this time, we reconfirm that we will not be approving any further PBUUC in-person events for now. This includes any event held by members or friends on the property of Paint Branch or events held elsewhere that are led or facilitated by Paint Branch staff or leadership. We recognize that this may be unwelcome news for some, but the safety and well-being of our members and friends is our top priority. We look forward to a time in the not-too-distant future when we can once again see each other in person.

The board also established a team to work towards investigating how to respond to incidents on our property that may, in the past, have led to immediate police contact. It is our responsibility to respond in a way that both affirms our values as UUs and considers the safety of all persons who may be involved in any given situation. As we end a summer when we have witnessed police violence that resulted in a lack of appropriate accountability, the General Assembly adopted an Action of Immediate Witness Calling for systematic change in policing and the interactions our congregations have with police, and our own DARRT committee adopted the 8th UU Principle and pledges to begin a conversation for congregation-wide adoption, it is time that we take these steps to make sure we are fully living into our values. The established team will explore best practices and reach out to Paint Branch staff and committees for insight and recommendations. How we respond matters.

The Board also continues to work towards making the governance systems of Paint Branch and the Board itself clear and transparent. We look forward to our Leadership Retreat happening on October 17th and have heard updates from our board working groups on Governance, Standard Operating Procedures, and Growing a Thriving Congregation. Please review the board reports for this month if you are interested in learning more about this important work.

Finally, as I end my letter, I want to thank all those who responded to the vandalization of our Black Lives Matter Sign. Thank you to Chuck, who created a temporary repair until something more permanent could be established and filed a report with the authorities. Thank you to the members of



Black Lives Matter: One Person and One Neighborhood at a Time by Ebony T. S. Contreras

Two weeks ago our Black Live Matter banner was vandalized. They cut out the word "Black" as if they want to cut black people out from their divine humanity. Next time we see our BLM banner, may it be whole again.

This is about our first and second principles: Right now black people and people of color in general do not experience their inherent worth and dignity in the United States of America. We must give black people more than knees on our necks, 7 bullets to the backs, and murder in our own homes. Death sentences for jogging while black.

Right now we have systematic, institutionalized racism in our country. We have what many scholars call the NEW Jim Crow which is – modern day slavery, mass incarceration, police brutality, and court decisions and policies that strip many colored people from their rights.

People of color bear the brunt of our country's problems. For example, in California right now, inmate fire fighters get paid an average of \$3.63 per day and earn an additional \$1 per day when deployed to an active fire. This is modern day slavery. Inmate fire fighters are putting their lives at risk to save homes in neighborhoods they probably would never be welcomed into.

Dr. MLK Jr said: "Laws cannot make a man love me but they can keep him from lynching me, and I consider that as pretty important also." I agree. We need the laws to support everything we've been protesting about. The truth is we cannot change people's values – but we can make it illegal and provide protection for those at the brunt end of hateful values in action.

It's a privilege to feel safe and welcomed in your own neighborhood. There are too many instances where black communities have been torn to pieces. Racist don't want blacks to feel safe or free. The stress of being black is indescribable and generational. We have modern lynching and the new Jim Crow making mockery of our 1st and 2nd principles.

History has not been kind to black people. The pandemic of racism can be invisible; it can be overt. But it always destroys. It snatches babies from their mother's arms before being locking them in cages. Rips people from their land; innocents shoved onto reservations and fed lies. To Puerto Rico being treated like second class Americans because they are primarily colored people. Racism is cruel. Racism is deadly. Racism is the opposite of everything we envision to be as Unitarian Universalists.

Racism is powerful. But it's not invincible. The great mystery of love and light is more powerful. More powerful than Racism. More powerful than hate.

Case in point: My neighborhood has had racist covenants since the 1940's. I recently reminded my neighbors of this and was shocked at their positive response. As a community we pushed beyond excuses, limitations, and discomfort to get our covenants changed. The humble invitation to my neighbors resulted in positive change. I'm still surprised, but I'm even more grateful.

Here at Paint Branch – we can also do small things that result in positive change. For example, we could adopt the 8th Principle of Unitarian Universalism. Many congregations have already adopted it. The 8th principle is about building a diverse multicultural Beloved Community. The 8th principle is love in action.

In this season of disgust – let's remember: Racism and hate are not invincible. We shall overcome. We will get through this. Not only will we survive, LOVE will THRIVE. LOVE needs us to Speak Up. To Act. To VOTE.

"As Unitarian Universalists we commit to shaping a world in which love and justice may thrive, where Black leadership, creativity, and resilience is celebrated while Black grief is honored and held with love."

In June, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) voted to adopt a call to action "to engage in the larger movement to end anti-Blackness and defund the police." (see the text of the AIW) What does "defund the police" mean? Last month, we held a conversation to examine the racist role of police through US history, particularly in modern times. On Tuesday, October 6th, we will discuss alternatives to calling the police and over-policing communities. India Harris and Rev. Jason Lydon will be joining us. India serves as Co-chair of the UUA General Assembly Safety Committee. Rev. Jason Lydon introduced the Action of Immediate Witness, Amen to Uprising, which was passed at this year's General Assembly. We have seen too many examples of policing that ends up destroying life or bodies. What alternatives do people have?
